The History

When the opportunity arose, he began teaching upgrading classes for adults at Grouard, specializing in math. During these years, Laura and Slim also farmed at Driftpile.

After graduation, Linda married Brian Smith and moved to Thompson, MB. There Brian worked as a geologist in a nickel mine, while Linda worked part-time until the arrival of her two children, Angela and Robin. Served at Calling Lake from fall of 1957 to fall of 1959 with our first child Julie. Our second child Joe, was born in 1958.

Lived in Oregon from fall of 1959 to fall of 1961 with time spent at Sandy Lake in summer of 1961. Our third child, Jill was born in 1960.

We lived and Leo went to Bible Instutute in Kitchener, Ontario from fall of 1961 to spring of 1964. Our fourth and fifth children, Kathy and Kerry were born in 1962.

Moved to Calling Lake in summer of 1964 and lived for one year in "Beatrice Ellison's" house while Leo ran Moosehorn Market and was pastor of Calling Lake Mennonite Church. We bought and lived in Ray Brubaker's house until fall of 1970. Leo worked for Calling Lake Logging Co-op and for the Government of Alberta as a loans officer for Alberta Housing. Our sixth child, Beth was born in 1966 and seventh child, Todd was born in 1967.

Moved to Slave Lake, Alberta in fall of 1970 and Leo continued to work for Alberta Housing and other Government agencies until winter of 1972 when Aspen Building Enterprise was formed with Harvey Burkholder and Lloyd Miller. We build many houses and developed a subdivision. Later we started a real estate agency in conjuction with building. Around 1974 the building part of the company was sold and Leo and Bonnie kept the real estate agency and bought an insurance agency we named Meetos. We ran that business for 10 years selling it to our son Joe and a partner. Later Joe bought out his partner and ran it himself for many years. While living in Slave Lake we were active in many community activities and attended and were very active in starting and building the Alliance Church.

In 1984 Leo spent the winter in Wabasca, Alberta working in the oil patch for his friend Deny Cardinal, Bonnie kept the home fires burning and did some subbing at the local Jr. high and High school. In the spring she followed Leo to Wabasca and helped Deny develop an office system. On the weekends we would come back to Slave Lake and spend time at our house at the Lake. Deny shut down his business in the bush after Christmas of 1986. Leo did a remodeling job (Alvin and Elaine Hershberger's at Calling Lake) and built a house in the spring and summer.

A call came in the winter of 1987 from Dave Hubert in Edmonton to come to the City and be part of a new MCC project called Housing Development. We accepted and moved to Edmonton July. All this time Bonnie was Dave Hubert's secretary and office manager.

Leo's job ended in the winter of 1995 and Bonnie kept working until summer of 1995. Working for MCC was a rewarding experience.

We answered an add in the Mennonite for an assistant maintenance person at Western Mennonite School in Salem Oregon in a voluntary position. We were accepted and made a move there in July of 1995. Leo filled the maintenance position and Bonnie cooked the evening meals three days a week and worked in the office one day. My VS term began in 1960, March if I recall correctly, and after a very long train ride across the Canadian prairies and an unbelievable drive through axle deep mud we arrived at Calling Lake. Spring and summer were spent at Calling Lake and then in the early fall I flew in to Chipewyan Lake and spent the winter with Fred & Elsie Gingerich, and Juanita. When I returned to the unit at Calling Lake I worked at the Ellison saw mill to support the unit. I did various jobs including driving log truck and cleaning log roads prior to the winter logging.

After returning home, to Smithville, Ohio I worked building poured concrete silos until I was married on May 26, 1962 and 3 days after our wedding we were in Chicago and I was attending DeVry Institute of Technology. My course of study was radio and TV service and communications. I obtained my diploma and my FCC First Class Commercial Radiotelephone license and returned home and started a radio & TV sales and service business.

Through the graciousness of Ellefson's I was employed by them for another 5 years after my VS term.


1995-2000 - These years found me working at Home Depot (170th Street) in Edmonton

Dear former VSers,

We are sorry we cannot be with you in the celebration of VS in Northern Alberta. We had previously committed ourselves to that weekend for a family reunion in Pennsylvania Even though we cannot be with you in body we will certainly be with you in spirit. We were happy that Elsie Gingerich visited us on May 31st and can bring personal greetings from us. We wish it were possible to have a half day to reminisce with each of you about your VS experience and catch up with your current life.

I started with MBM in May 1954 and in June J.D. Graber suggested that I plan to attend the Alberta/Saskatchewan Conference meetings at Carstairs over the July 1st weekend because they had interest in developing VS work in Native communities (up north). While at conference I learned to know conference representatives and their interest in this development. I also learned that it was arranged for me to travel to Smith with Willis and Florence Yoder to investigate service possibilities. It rained all weekend and when we headed north I soon discovered the challenges of travel in North country. The paved roads ended when we arrived at Clyde Corner and I thought it was bad until we got to Athabasca where the road became pure mud and water holes. It was planned for me to see a man by the name of Slim Elfson near Smith but after a number of attempts to get there and being stuck, Willis gave up and I never got to make that contact.

In spite of the problems we faced we did not give up on this dream of service in Native communities. We began working with a young couple who were interested in community service in the north country. Ike and Millie Glick with their young son, John Edgar, stopped in Elkhart for orientation in their converted hearse which became the base of operation until they got a building constructed at Calling Lake.

This became the beginning of placing teachers, nurses, community workers and Bible School teachers in many communities.

As we reflect on the development it seems like it was a comet streaking across Northern Alberta with shooting stars striking places like Calling Lake, Sandy Lake, Eaglesham, Imperial Mills, Anzac, Marlboro, Edson, Chipwyan Lake and Lac la Bische. These are the ones that come to mind but my files are buried in Mennonite Church Archives at Goshen.

After leaving VS we spent time in St. Louis, Missouri where John studied mechanics and Sylvia worked as operating room nurse. After returning to Michigan John pursued his career in mechanics and Sylvia in nursing until 1971 when we purchased our first business. It was a trucking company; hauling crude oil and bulk cement. In 1982 we purchased a Bandag retread shop because it complimented our trucking endeavor. We continued with our businesses until we sold the trucking company in December 1989 and the tire shop in 1997. This was the beginning of our retirement and we soon found we needed to have something to do that was more challenging and worthwhile.

In 1996 we were contacted by MCC about a project in New Brunswick, Canada. They were beginning a tire recycling plant to provide jobs in a small town that had a 30% unemployment rate. We worked with the MCC people for about a year and a half and then because of problems there we went to New Brunswick and took over the management of the plant and became sole owners in 1998. We now have people in place to manage the business and we spend about a week each month overseeing the operation and giving guidance to the employees.

We are also working with CPI in Honduras. This is a big challenge and a huge blessing. It is tied in with TRACC in New Brunswick and provides jobs and helps the needy in both places. We have learned to love the Honduran people; especially the young people.

Our life isn't all work! We have enjoyed traveling to Alaska, Hawaii. Australia, Mexico, Honduras, Canada and across the US. We enjoy camping and have taken several tours and cruises where we have met many wonderful people. We enjoy gardening and working in our yard when we are home.

We are looking forward to seeing old friends and making new friends while at the reunion. See you soon.

My family had brought Ann to Calling Lake in 1956, and it was a very muddy trip – we said we arrived "slidways." Dad thought he could be of help with some carpentry projects. Dad and Mom volunteered to work at calling Lake for the summer of 1957. We also spent some time at Smith doing work for Willis Yoder.

One of the first tasks was to erect a former oil driller's shack to house the summer fellows. The floor, walls and roof were all stacked on a pile, and needed to be set up. New tar paper on the roof and sides kept out the rain.

Stuart was a fisherman, he had brought along his motor, but the unit did not have a boat. So he made one, and I was selected to hold the other end of the boards and fetch screws. I learned a lot about building a boat.



We needed to get the boat to the lake – so "making do with what we had", Stuart used his car trunk, Roy and I carried the back part of the boat, and Elma carried the flag. It was a grand parade as I recall!



The unit helped clean up the Calling Lake cemetery.

Ike somehow came up with a small Piper Cub plane. Slim bulldozed out a landing strip, and we chopped away some of the taller brush around the strip. A hanger was made of logs and slab wood. Nothing fancy, but it seemed to work pretty good.





We also worked at Willis Yoder's place at Smith for several weeks. Dad did a number of carpentry jobs including hanging doors in Willis' home. One day a car stopped and said they had hit a bear. We went with Ed (Willis' son) to find it – Ed taking along his rifle. The driver showed us the location, Ed searched around in the ditch - while we offered helpful advice... "Be careful – don't get too close – wounded bears are really mean etc." Ed found him and promptly "dispatched." Dad had a great time butchering his first bear. We ate a lot of bear meat. (fish is better)

Back at Calling Lake, I helped Roy build a new outhouse, and got to use a hammer and nail on siding. It was a grand 2 seater! Always thought Roy was a pretty cool guy. When the holes were cut out, the piece looked kinda like a heart, so Roy and Paul wrote their girl friends names on them, and tacked them up above the door of the shack for decoration.






Dad also worked at siding the VS house, and was by then good enough with a hammer to be able to nail on my half of the piece!






My role was to shuttle notes back and forth, pretty much oblivious of what really happening. Apparently all of the invitations to unit activities worked! This is their engagement photo.

The summer of '57 was a good experience for a 13-14 year old boy. I enjoyed being around Ike and all of the guys, no doubt being a real pest most times. I did enjoy working with each of the summer VS'ers on projects, and it felt especially good to be able to stay in the shack and be "one of the guys." I learned a lot from their "guy" conversations, especially about girlfriends since that subject was a big mystery to me.
