#### **Greetings from the President,**

#### So, what's coming up this spring and summer?

Well. Let's try to capture most of it



<u>Historical Committee</u>: working on the facility and artifacts. Upgrades to building being sought and the establishment of drop-in hours for those who would like to visit the building. Did you know this is bookable for small meetings? They have received \$25,000 in funding from the MD but are always looking at new creative ideas to raise more.

**Seniors committee**: Seniors luncheons, quilting b's, bingos, fundraisers, drop in coffee, community wood program (thank you ALPAC) oh and they also received a grant for \$20,000 to promote more seniors' activities. <u>Community Development</u>: In conjunction with Bigstone and the M.D. we provided funding for the winter carnival. Also, we have set up a bereavement fund for those who unfortunately lost loved ones. We have also continued to think of ways that the old Job Corps site can be utilized. I know this facility would be great for something; what is that?? Having ideas is great, wanting to be involved and learn more is better.

Community meeting on May 21 at 11: am topics were;

Our three-year plan: It is always being updated. We need people to provide feedback on this plan.

A financial update from Tim Siewert our treasurer, special thanks to Melaney Guthrie for supplying accounting services.

**Lake Quality**: Petra Rowell gave us a great update on the basin and how Calling Lake is apart of this, and how it feeds the river. Orlof Lake actually feeds another system. Who knew!

**Lake sampling** is being done this summer. They are looking for volunteers with boats to take the people out to take samples from the lake. Annette Manning is our contact for this.

**RCMP**: An update by Constable Griffen and Lovell provided great information on home security, and yes Video Surveillance is very useful in court for the RCMP..

**Firef Dept:** Update from Reanna Courtorielle our Fire Chief on the importance of volunteer recruitment, and how our department had to fight a forest fire as no one was available from Alberta departments to fight it. They probably saved a lot of homes from being burned down.

**MD update** supplied by council member Cheri Courtorielle, great news about the senior housing project, spray pad for kids that is now open, and new branding going on for communities within the MD, and how they are pressuring the RCMP to have staff members in Calling Lake.

**Bigstone** update given by Gloria Anderson. Priorities are healing centres, rehabilitation support for those recovering from addictions, mental health support for those in need, and how to get support. Possibility of Bigstone police being implemented. The need for cooperation and seeking understanding from the different factions of people who make Calling Lake home. Communication being a two-way street for everyone.

**Sport, Recreation and Culture** update from Angela Lightning. Spray park; Sport for Life funded for local people to attend the International Physical Literacy Conference in New York. The staff said it was life changing. This past winter they opened a lighted skating trail with bonfire pit/area. It was well used and very well received.

**Recreation and Sailing club update** by Nora Ross. The facilities are rentable. There will be sailing lessons offered this summer to youth and hopefully to adults.

**School update**: Our principle is leaving! Jason Wilks sat on our board and will be sorely missed. A great connection allowed us to assist in setting up indoor and outdoor archery, contributing to team uniforms, fundraisers, and special gifts for those who graduated.

This logo speaks to the intent and spirit of the work being done to gather and share Calling Lake's history.

The entire image forms a circle – the sharing circle that unites us in seeking our history.

Its eagle feather symbolizes honour and respect for the courage, strength and wisdom that has created our beautiful community.

Its spoked wheels recall our ties to communities near and far from which people came. Its four colors honour the four directions and speak to those things that mean so much to us as people living together at Calling Lake:

- The blue of our lakes and rivers, which folks have travelled and relied on for food.

Hunting and gathering continues to be the theme for the Calling Lake Historical Committee. The expanding list of "friends of the project" now includes a dynamic team at Elk Lake that has been researching and recording that area's history for decades.

Kathy Stubbs, Wilf Brooks, writer Cheryl Mahaffy, forest historian Bruce Mayer and author/historian Blair Jean visited Elk Lake on April 19, 2023. After a "get to know you" meeting over lunch, hosted by Marvin Bjornstad, Billie Milholland and Vicki Brooker of the Elk Point Historical Society, we toured Mural Park and the Peter Fidler Statue, two of the Elk Point Society's many projects. Next, we visited the Interpretive Centre on the banks of the North Saskatchewan River, where Fort George and Buckingham House once stood. We ended the day with a very informative round table discussion.

Meanwhile, we continue to follow leads and catalogue the collection. Several new items were both gifted and loaned to us this winter, so the space has a new look. A big thank you to the MD and Merle Laroche who painted the walls in Indigenous colours. It looks fantastic.

The Centre was open from 1:00 - 4:00 pm on Friday, Saturday and Sunday of the May long weekend. Many thanks to all who chose to visit! We appreciated the help identifying people in our pictures collection whose names have been lost over time.

### **Early Logging History in Calling Lake**

Forest History Association of Alberta

"When Jerry Bauer was 17, he came to the Calling Lake area to work with his older brother Mike at Mike's sawmill. Sixty-five years later, Jerry Bauer drove to Calling Lake to talk to anyone who might be able to help him locate the old sawmill operation. All he could recall was a "fork in the road, a steep hill on either side of a creek, and that Calling Lake was about 17 miles" away.

As part of the Calling Lake Community Society (CLCS) work, an interview was set up with Jerry Bauer on March 23, 2023, to gather and share information on Calling Lake's rich history of logging and sawmilling. Those in attendance were Jerry Bauer, Wilf Brooks (CLCS History Committee), Rudy Wiselka (long-time sawmill owner in Calling Lake), and Bruce Mayer (Forest History Association of Alberta).

From historical files, the group determined that Mike Bauer's sawmill operated from 1956 to 1960 in Section 30, Township 74, Range 22, W4M, just south of Rock Island Lake. Trees came from permits held by Steve Pidzarko and Sebastian Wolok, and local farmer permits coordinated by Joseph Shewchuk. Jerry Bauer recalls that his brother, a gifted inventor and mechanic, set up two Chrysler motors to power the sawmill.

Jerry Bauer recalls going to Tanasiuk's hall in Calling Lake to watch a "cowboys and Indians" movie. When the "Indians" were doing well, the locals from Calling Lake were cheering and yelling; when the cowboys were doing well, the white guys were cheering and yelling. He said the evening was enjoyed by everyone.

With the sawmill located just south of Rock Island Lake, it seems the Y" Jerry Bauer remembers in the road is the intersection of the old Sandy Lake trail and the newer trail to the west of Rock Island Lake that later became Highway 813. If so, the steep hill on either side of the creek is most likely where the old road crosses Rock Island River. Jerry Bauer recalls the hills were a challenge in early spring, with mud and frost coming out of the ground. Calling Lake Forest Ranger Bill McPherson would remind all sawmill operators each year to shut down and get out of the bush before spring break.

#### Was our lake ever known as 'Talking Lake'?

Look closely at the map shown here, and you'll see that our lake is labeled "Talking Lake." Curious! Note Lalso the HBC label by the lake, indicating a Hudson's Bay Company post.

This is an excerpt of a map we received from Blair Jean of Fort McMurray, who with Allison McKinnon has written extensively about the history of the Clearwater River watershed and surrounding areas. Someone posted the map on Blair's very informative "Blair Jean Author Historian" Facebook page, and he kindly passed it to us.

#### Early map of 'Talking Lake'

The map is not totally accurate, Jean notes, "But it is good to know there was an HBC trading post at Calling Lake at the time."

We shared the map with Mark Lund, another great friend of the Calling Lake History Project, and he in turn passed it to Andreas Korsos, who has carefully studied maps of historic fur trading posts. Korsos responded that he has found no record of a post at Calling Lake, but that short-lived outposts (common as the HBC and rival North West Company played hopscotch in pursuit of furs) weren't always included on official lists of posts. He speculates that people from the Lac la Biche settlement came here to trap, and that a permanent post would have been unprofitable without a local population. "I would suspect that if there was a post at Calling Lake it was seasonal and likely of not long life."

The person posting the map labeled it "Map drawn by Peter Fidler, likely 1819/1820." But Korsos believes someone else, perhaps an HBC employee, drew the map, for three reasons:

- The map is less accurate than a surveyor and cartographer of Fidler's skill would produce.
- Fidler's early-career exploration of the Athabasca didn't include the area around what we know as Calling Lake.
- By 1819, Fidler was busy with the Red River Settlement in Manitoba, from which he never returned.

# Calling Lake volunteer/ participation 2023 update with the Alberta Lake Management Society (ALMS)

#### Who Is Alberta Lake Management Society?

The Alberta Lake Management Society (ALMS) has several objectives, one of which is to collect and interpret water quality data on Alberta Lakes. Equally important is educating lake users about their aquatic environment, encouraging public involvement in lake management, and facilitating cooperation and partnerships between government, industry, the scientific community, and lake users. #### What does Calling Lake Community Society do with ALMS?

Through previous AGM updates, you may be aware that we are lucky to have Calling Lake picked to participate in several sampling programs through ALMS. We have managed to continue our involvement with a commitment to sample during the winter and every other year for summer data capture. On occasion, our volunteers support requests for additional grab samples for analysis for U of A research biologists or other government agencies when necessary.

The goal is to capture as much research and data about our lake to have sufficient information for our community to ask questions to make data-driven future decisions. This work will help us explore the concerns and questions that many ask as we observe our lake such as:



- How has the lake changed over time with the impacts of industry, new lagoons, settlement, and activities on/around the lake?
- Are algae blooms the same, worse, or better than the past? How do they compare to other lakes? Is the lake healthy for our future?
- Are winter conditions changing on the lake?
- How can this data be used for future stewards of the lake?

#### 2023 Winter Sampling

Owen and Tamara Larson were instrumental as volunteers for the Winter Lake Keepers Program to take lake samples through the ice to study: lake hypoxia; cyanobacteria conditions (yes – there is algae in the winter!); water temperatures and phosphorus; amongst other measures in the Athabasca River & Lesser Slave Lake Watershed.

We are anxious to see the 2023 results to compare history – and sincerely thank Owen and Tamara for their ongoing support to our community!



#### Volunteers needed now to schedule Summer Samples

We are back on the list and in need volunteers to help with Summer Lake Watch Program to collect data with a Water Technician from ALMS. <u>5 spots need to be filled</u> (one sample per month between June to September) that will need a calm morning for roughly 2-3 hours with a volunteer and boat. Don't worry – windy days or poor weather can be rescheduled.

Your morning involves taking the Water Technician and their equipment to various points across the lake to take samples from the top, middle and bottom level of the lake, measure and record temperature readings and capture samples ALMS to take back for analysis in Edmonton. It is a memorable way to learn more about lake health, involve children to learn more about biology and participate in capturing this important information.

We need 5 volunteers that we will coordinate a date, meeting location and introduction /briefing on what to expect.

#### Fish Health Monitoring - Metis Nation Study

Did you know that the Metis Nation of Alberta does **fish health monitoring across Alberta**? In 2021, the Fish Health monitoring program was launched as part of ALMS to collect data on fish health, including weight, length, condition, and palatability.

#### **Calling Lake School Report**

We are finishing up a busy year at Calling Lake School.

Our land-based learning courses have been an important part of our school programming this year. Moose camp in the fall and ice fishing in February were highlights. We learned about traditional harvesting and food preparation methods from our local knowledge keepers. Land based learning also gave our students an opportunity to learn traditional teachings.

We have partnered with the Woodland Operators Learning
Foundation (WOLF) and ALPAC to learn about the forestry
industry. "Forestry Week" at Calling Lake School took place from
May 1st to 5th. Our high school students completed 5 forestry
CTS courses and earned 55 credits. They learned about
operating forestry equipment on WOLF simulators and talked to
experts from ALPAC about the wide range of careers in the
forestry economic sector. The week was a great learning
experience, and we are looking forward to building on it next year.

Our archery club had a successful season. We participated in several Edwin Parr Invitational Tournaments in Athabasca, and our young archers did very well in their first shoot. We hope to build on our success next year.

Our Assurance Plan has been posted on our website for your consideration. Calling Lake School is focused on improving in three areas:

- 1) Literacy and Numeracy
- 2) Making students feel safe and welcome at school.
- 3) The amount of mental health supports available to our students.

We are grateful for all the support from our community.

This will be my last year at Calling Lake School. It has been great working with the students, staff and community over the last three years. I wish everyone the best of luck in their future endeavors.





A 45 min class: designed for seniors, or any adult with limited mobility. This class takes place sitting on a chair, preferably without arms, to enable ease of movement. Some standing poses, using the aid of a chair may be incorporated.

The purpose of the class is to bring gentle movement into the body that will lead to greater mobility, lengthen and stenghten muscles, increase lung capacity using different breathing techniques as well as enhance the nervous system to decrease stress and increase mindfulness. Techniques that balance hemispheres of the brain, stimulate brain activity and increase the cardiovascular system are used as well as movements such as Kyria (repetitive movement working with energy). Combining these techniques can create an overall sense of well being by connecting mind, body and soul.






